In December 2014, Habitat's Board of Directors adopted a landmark strategic plan, *Transforming Lives, Changing Neighborhoods*. The plan will guide Habitat's path to build our 500th home by





2018. Recognizing that it is the families inside our Habitat homes that count, the goals of the plan are to —

- Build a transformational family support program that empowers families to become successful homeowners and leaders in the community
- Build the 500th Habitat home by 2018 by constructing homes in eight neighborhoods in Vanderburgh and Posey Counties in need of revitalization
- Build sustainability of the Habitat organization through comprehensive resource development, robust communications and faithful stewardship of gifts

\$6.4 million is needed to fund the goals of the strategic plan — \$6 million for new home construction, \$250,000 for family support and \$150,000 to build organizational sustainability. Habitat will build in the Ballard, CHAIN, Glenwood, Howell, Jacobsville, Star and Waggoner neighborhoods of Evansville, as well as in Mt. Vernon.

Last spring Habitat's Board of Directors committed the organization to begin a comprehensive capital campaign to raise the needed funds. Longtime Habitat supporters Alan and Sharon Braun agreed to serve as the campaign's co-chairs and recruited other community leaders to form a campaign cabinet with Habitat's board and development committee members.

Habitat supporters gathered at Deaconess' Johnson Hall November 24, 2015, for a public announcement of the campaign. An astounding \$5.6 million — 88 per cent of the goal — had already been raised at the time of the public announcement.

Your help is needed for the remaining \$800,000. Your support will transform lives, change neighborhoods and make a lasting positive impact in the lives of our partner families, in the community and in the Habitat organization.

The past few months have been full of excitement for Habitat for Humanity of Evansville. Pope Francis House

Last fall Habitat received a new opportunity — an anonymous donor chose the Evansville affiliate to receive \$60,000 as seed money to build a home in honor of Pope Francis. An additional \$40,000 was needed in order to receive the seed money and the challenge was quickly met!

Our anonymous donor articulated three tenets for the build —

- To honor Pope Francis for his commitment to social justice and reinvigorating the Catholic Church
- To provide a unifying, celebratory opportunity for both Catholic and non-Catholic volunteers to work towards a common goal (as Pope Francis says, "Work confers dignity.")
- To further Habitat's mission of building and preserving homes

Stephen Ralph and his son Victor were selected as the Pope Francis Build partner family.

Many volunteers helped — Mater Dei and

football players built and raised the walls of the house, Evansville Christian Life Center employees helped paint the interior for homeowner and co-worker, Stephen, and Pope Francis himself (at least his cardboard image) was there to "supervise" it all.

The house was completed just in time for Pope Francis' arrival to the United States. Friends and supporters of both Habitat and the pope met at Turoni's on Main Street to march in the "Welcome Pope Francis Parade" with signs welcoming and affirming the pope's teachings. Bishop Thompson attended the dedication and warm wishes were sent with him as he traveled to Philadelphia for the World Meeting of Families.

We thank all those who were involved in this special build — you are the reason why the anonymous donor chose the Evansville affiliate to be among the Habitat homes built across the nation in honor of Pope Francis.

Continuing a Standard of Quality

Twenty-five years from now the Habitat families of today should need minimal modifications for their homes. Habitat plans for today, tomorrow and forever, and has implemented "aging in place" designs for all homes. All doorways are three feet wide and all rooms have a three-foot turn radius, fit for potential wheelchair use.



In addition to reducing future modifications, reducing future maintenance costs is another important focus. Habitat's current house designs help reduce the need for ongoing exterior maintenance, saving homeowners time and money. Affordability and energy efficiency work together hand in hand. 

On December 4, 2015, Rev. Dr. F. P. Miller passed away peacefully in his home after a brief battle with pancreatic cancer. F. P. served with distinction as a member of the Habitat for Humanity of Evansville Board of Directors from 1986 - 2013, and in 2014 he and his wife, Pearlie, were inducted into the inaugural class of the Habitat Emeritus Board of Directors. F. P. served as a committed "pray-er-in-chief" for the Habitat ministry. In the early days of Habitat, when the challenges of a fledgling organization often seemed overwhelming, F. P. would pray and things would be better.

F. P. served as a wise and compassionate counselor with a deep knowledge of the challenging circumstances of families in poverty. We remember F. P. for his leadership in the community and his deep commitment to Habitat. His family will be in our thoughts and prayers.

Why Give? Wayne and Jewell Henning

For Wayne Henning, understanding the bigger picture is what it's all about. Wayne first became involved in Habitat during the 1992 Blitz when his employer, Old National Bank, sponsored a house. His wife, Jewell, worked right alongside him painting many houses during the blitz. Wayne and Jewell were initially impressed with the organization of volunteers and how they worked along side of the partner families on their new home. After seeing the process of what it takes to build a Habitat home, from family selection to down payments, the Hennings felt all those involved in Habitat had admirable dedication. The couple has continued to support Habitat ever since, through financial support, time and advocacy for the mission.

With each Old National Bank sponsorship throughout the years, the importance of the neighborhood became very close to Wayne. When Habitat moved into a new neighborhood, his involvement didn't just stop with painting or building the house — he was out cleaning up the streets and getting to know neighbors. "When you invest financially into an area, you are also investing in developing all aspects of that community," Wayne says. He explains that seeing the before and after of a street is one way he sees his impact. "Because of Habitat, you can see the change in the neighborhood."

Wayne has always had a passion for improving Evansville and stresses that no area should be neglected. He explains that providing families with an affordable mortgage is the

first step in changing our city.
"Housing is everything—the house is the key to breaking the chain of poverty," Wayne says. He explains that Habitat partner families take



pride in their homeownership, and thus have pride in their community. "This is our way of changing our part of the world."

Now, their sons, Brian and Jeff, are very active with Habitat as well. Brian is on the Board of Directors for Greater Indy Habitat, and Jeff's wife Tricia is on the Board of Directors for Habitat for Humanity of Evansville. Wayne and Jewell are very proud of their family's commitment to providing homeownership to those in need.

As Wayne and Jewell continue to support Habitat, they enjoy seeing the growth of the organization. They have enjoyed getting to know partner families as well as all those involved in Habitat, encouraging others to help create the change in our community they are so passionate about. "You feel it in your heart," Wayne says, "It's not just giving money, it's being a part of it."

Sharon Goldston

Sharon Goldston never thought she would be able to live comfortably. Having had numerous back surgeries and lasting leg injuries, using her walker makes day-to-day living challenging. She was previously living in an apartment, with limited parking and a laundry facility that was outside and down the hall. For Sharon, doing laundry was something she dreaded. "I would have to get all my quarters and load up my basket and walk down there, only to hope that a washer was available." Walking anywhere, even from the car to her apartment, was difficult.

When Sharon heard about Habitat, she thought it was too good to be true. After applying and working on her sweat equity in the Habitat office, Sharon's house began to be constructed. Because of Sharon's disability, her home was built with a wheelchair ramp, as well as a walk-in shower, making it much easier for her to get around.

Now, nearly four years later, Sharon is still in awe of her home. "I walk around and think, 'wow, this is really mine?'" she says. Sharon never has to worry about walking long



distances from her car or to the laundry facility. "One of my favorite parts is just being able to do laundry whenever I want," she says. Sharon still loves to show off her shower, ramp and washer and dryer to company. "I just feel so comfortable here," she says, "I'm just very fortunate."

Dianne Lehman had been praying for a way to have her own place. At 49, she found herself divorced, living with her sister and unsure about her future plans. Dianne is a mother of two children in their 20's, but hasn't been able to see them too often because of her living situation. As she began to try and get back on her feet, looking for an apartment became a nightmare. Dianne feared how she would be able to afford rent and still be able to pay for other necessities.

Since beginning her partnership with Habitat, Dianne feels her life is back on track and that she has a purpose. She has enjoyed working on her sweat equity, as each day reminds her of the bright future she will have in her home. She is also excited for the new neighborhood community she will join. Dianne says working alongside other partner families, who are her future neighbors, has given her the feeling of having an extended family. Overall, through this transition stage in life,

Dianne says the experience has truly made her happy. "I've gotten closer to God, joined Bible studies, and feel this independence that I've never had before."

Now Dianne has a whole new life to look forward to. She is excited to have a place where her children can visit, and where she can host family holidays and gatherings. Dianne says she is ready to pick up extra shifts at work once she moves in so she can save up to decorate her home nicely. She is also excited to take care of her lawn and landscaping. More than anything, Dianne is looking forward to the sense of pride she will have in owning her own home. "Everything seems to just be moving toward my goals."
